	Yes, the project formally ended in October 2023, but its outputs (website, animated short) continue to be used as advocacy material. Depending on additional funding, they hope to continue the project and add an additional co-produced component.

	People with lived experience of poverty in Dublin.

	The project involved 11 participants (including one couple) who were interviewed individually – resulting in 10 interviews. The research results and animation are used for general public outreach by ATD Ireland and Students of Trinity College and, therefore, serve other people by highlighting the ongoing issues of people living in poverty.

	Deprived areas in the City of Dublin.

16.	Are you able to talk about the initial idea to introduce the project?		
	Yes.		
17.	Who had the initial idea?		
	Dr Joe Whelan, Trinity College Dublin and ATD Ireland (Full collaboration in the initial idea, design of project, project delivery).		
18.	How did the idea for the project come about?		
	Dr Joe Whelan and community activists at ATD Ireland wanted to produce a piece of research that highlighted the lived experiences of those living in poverty and would have direct benefits for people experiencing poverty. ATD's work focuses on highlighting poverty as a social phenomenon and working towards its eradication. When the Irish Research Council offered a grant for researchers to partner with civil or civic society groups to conduct research that would benefit them, Dr. Whelan had a meeting with activists and paid staff members at ATD to discuss project ideas. Together they came up with the idea of doing a co-produced piece of research, including interviews. Instead of conducting traditional interviews, they decided to use walking interviews in which research participants themselves would decide the walking routes. With walking interviews, they wanted to diffuse the power imbalance often present in an interview context and ensure that the interviews would be meaningful within the context of the participant's lives and their lived experiences of poverty.

	They drew inspiration from Prof. Maggie O'Neil, Sociology/Criminology Dept., University College of Cork who has published a book called 'Walking Methods: Research on the Move'

	Dr Joe Whelan, paid staff and community activists of ATD Ireland.
